Who gets to create art and why? Sussex art organisations join forces to ask the question this summer with new exhibition and studio programme

Putting Ourselves in the Picture Fabrica with Project Art Works Fabrica 13 July-26 August 2019

Fabrica, Brighton's Centre for Contemporary Art, will open its doors this summer with an accessible studio and temporary gallery for artists of all ages, levels and abilities to access. Work created in the studio space will also then be exhibited at Fabrica for the public to experience.

The exhibition is a co-commission with Project Art Works as part of the EXPLORERS – an ambitious, creative and collaborative programme of work with neurodiverse people across the UK. *Putting Ourselves in the Picture* is multilayered in both the questions it asks and the opportunities that it offers to a broad range of visitors, whilst also positioning creators with and without complex needs, at the centre of the exhibition. *Putting Ourselves in the Picture* also asks questions about the politics of who gets to make art and whose artwork is worthy of public view.

Three artists-in-residence will lead activities in the gallery which will be accessible to visitors of varying capacities. The artists, who all have a socially engaged practice, are Sara Dare, Jo Offer and Annis Joslin. Sara Dare plans to create a giant loop of canvas, playing with Fabrica's unique architecture to create an inviting space for visitors to make work within. Jo Offer will invite artists to create large floor based work during her residency via playful pop up activities. Finally, Annis Joslin will invite people to respond to a series of objects and consider free-play, assemblage, notation, and documentation.

Once the artists have worked with studio visitors and participants to-create work, a group of curators will then select from what has been produced for presentation in the gallery. Curators include: Kate Adams, Director of Project Art Works, Marc Steene, Director, and Cornelia Marland, Exhibitions Co-ordinator, from Outside In, and independent curator Lisa Slominski

whose involvement is closely linked to their wider ambition of diversifying the artworks for public consumption.

**Liz Whitehead, Director, Fabrica**, said, "At the heart of this experimental exhibition is the question 'who gets to create art and whose work is selected, and thereby validated, for public consumption?' The project also explores how artists with a socially engaged practice develop their work. And whilst highly respected as artists, when working as artist-facilitators the work produced is often marginalised within arts institutions. Everyone who would like to make art will have the opportunity to do that during this exhibition and have the possibility to have it exhibited at Fabrica "
